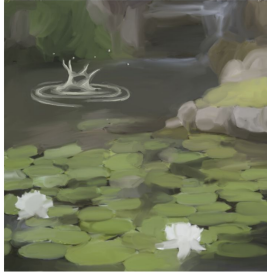
The Old Pond

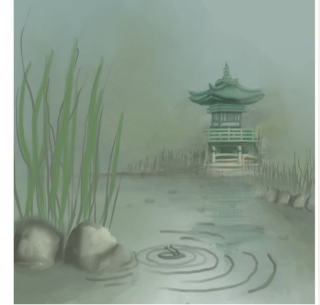

My previous project visually interpreted The Old Pond by Matsuo Basho, displaying how different translations of a haiku create different atmospheres and perceptions of the poem.

Process: Focused on a sequence of frames to represent the change of state from stillness to motion.

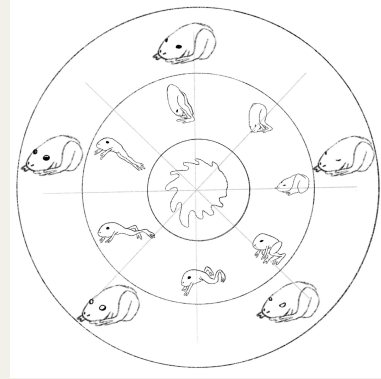
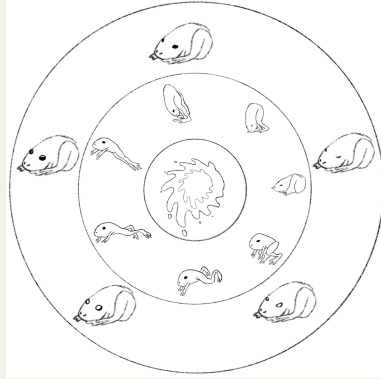
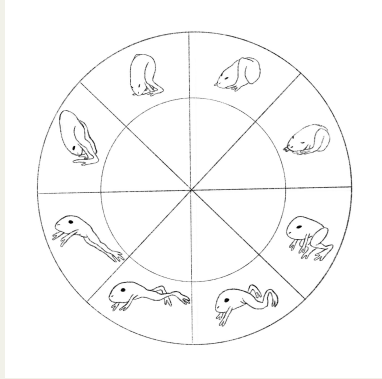
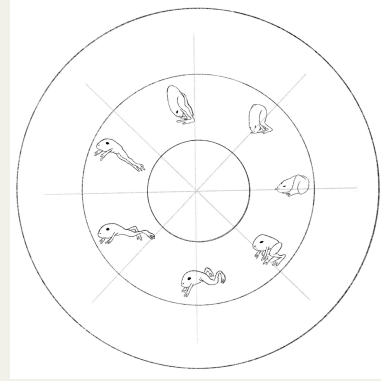
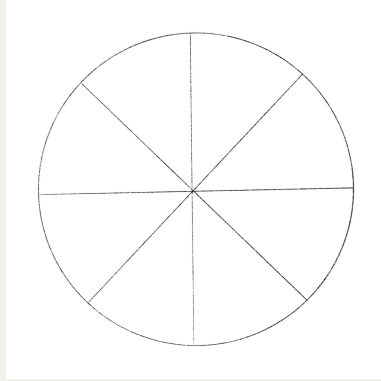
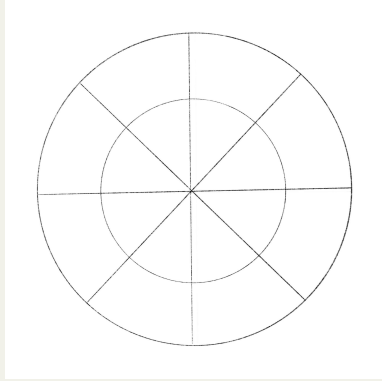
I turned this into a flipbook animation as my publication.



Each frame of the animation is an iteration. Here, i'm exploring how the meaning of the poem is translated visually through the narrative of the animation.

Through sequencing each frame of the frog leaping into the pond, I play with time and the relationship between images to convey a narrative.

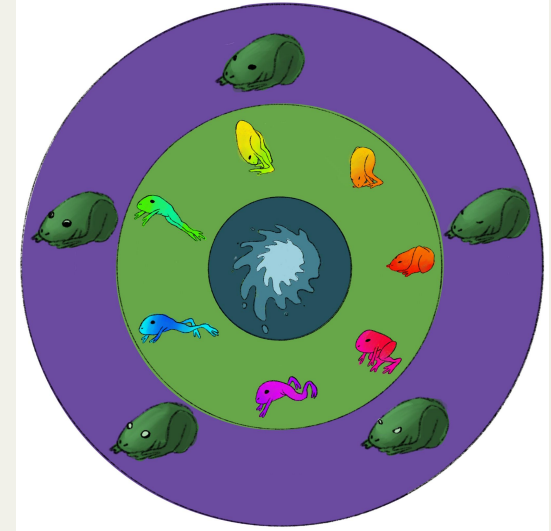
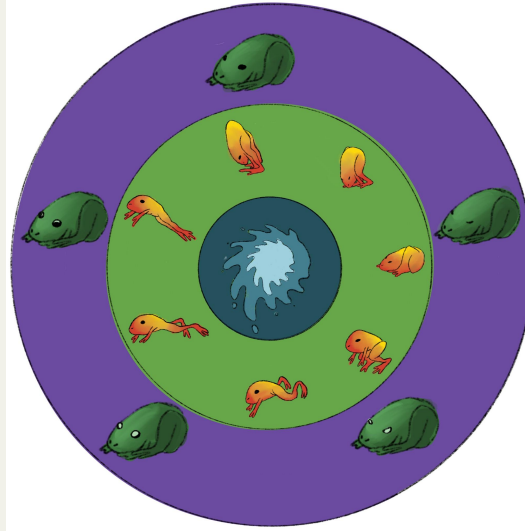
Creating layered iterations to explore the visual and emotional interpretation rather than literal storytelling, presented in a phenakistoscope with 3 layers, 5 frames, 7 frames, and 5 frames to represent the structure of a traditional Haiku.

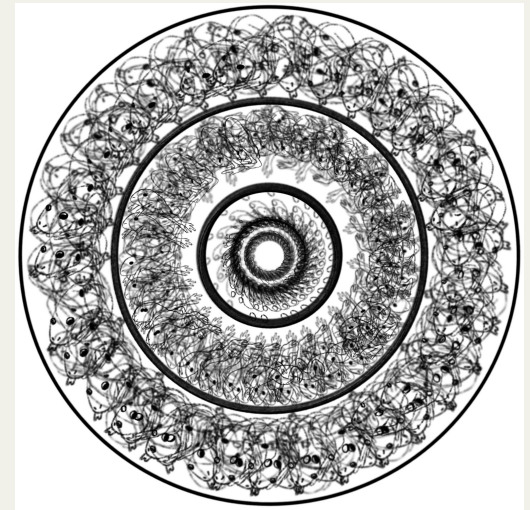
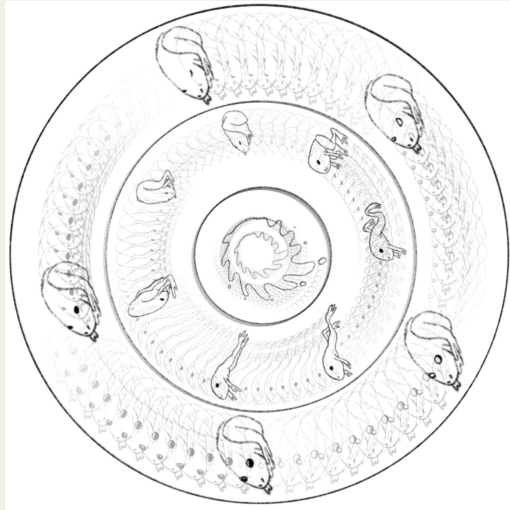
Len Lye's 'A Colour Box' animation synchronised visuals with music, creating a dialogue between senses.. My next iterations explored movement and color.

My iterations engage a similar interplay between visual rhythm and poetic form (the haiku) to Lye's work, encouraging reading the animation as a sensory experience.

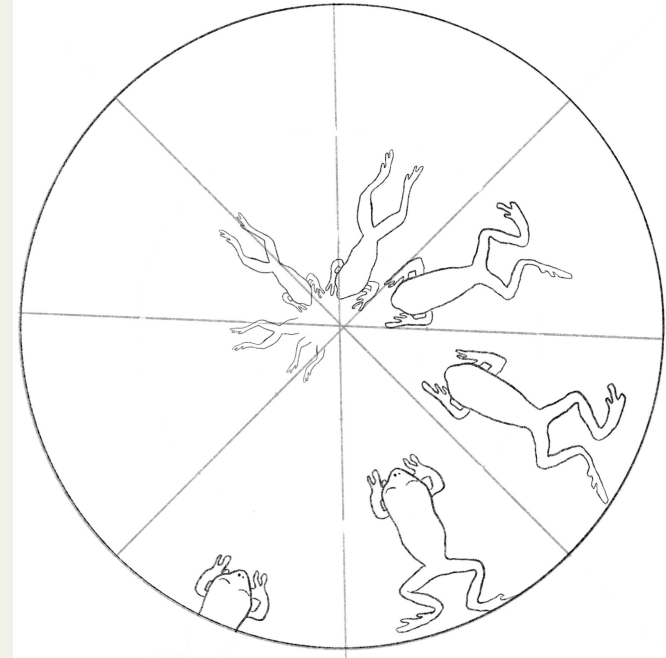


Here, I also experiment with different speeds creating different kaleidoscopic visuals.

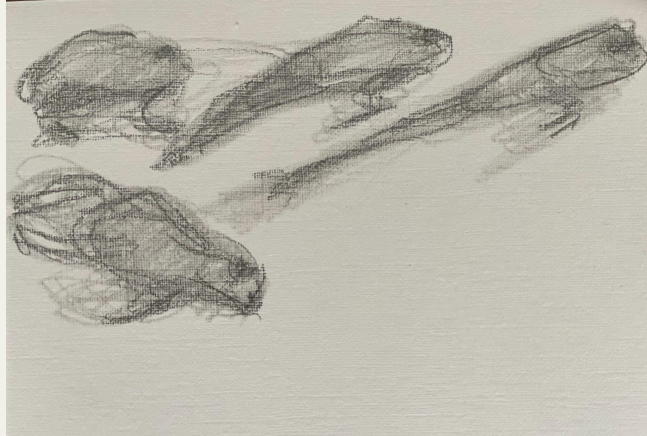
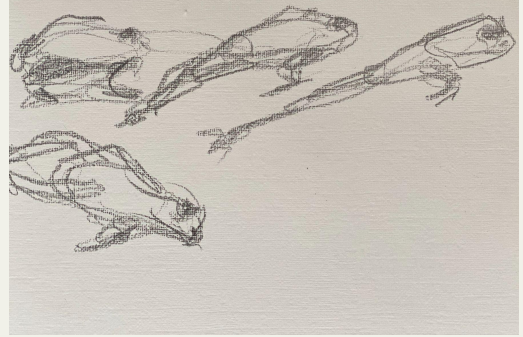
